RUSSIAN 111-112 (8 or 5*)—Elementary

These courses are linked; the second must be completed to receive any credit toward degree requirements for the first. A basic course in Russian which includes the spoken language, fundamental grammar and reading. G. McCaughrin.

Fall-Winter

RUSSIAN 113 (3)—Elementary Conversation

Prerequisite: Russian 112 or its equivalent. An introduction to idiomatic Russian conversation and composition. New and remedial grammar are introduced as needed to facilitate conversation and composition. Conducted essentially in Russian. G. McCaughrin.

Spring

★RUSSIAN 261-262 (8)—Intermediate

These courses are linked; the second must be completed to receive any credit toward degree requirements for the first. Prerequisite: Russian 111-112 or its equivalent. Continuation of Russian 111-112 with some attention to Russian literature and culture. Staff.

Fall-Winter

RUSSIAN 301 (3)—Advanced Russian

Prerequisite: Russian 262 or permission of the instructor. Speaking, reading and writing of Russian with increased attention to Russian literature and advanced grammar. Brodsky.

Fall

RUSSIAN 302 (3)—Advanced Russian

Prerequisite: Russian 301. A continuation of Russian 301. Brodsky.

Winter

RUSSIAN 313 (3)—Advanced Conversation

Prerequisites: Russian 262 with a grade of B+ or better, Russian 302, or permission of the instructor. A course designed for the advanced language student with emphasis on conversation. Staff.

Spring

★[RUSSIAN 315 (3)—19th-Century Russian

Literature]

(Fall 1999 and alternate years)

Prerequisite: Russian 262 or equivalent. The novels, plays, poetry, and literary movements of the 19th century. Authors examined include Pushkin, Gogol, Tolstoy, Dostoevsky, Turgenev, and Chekhov. Conducted in Russian. Brodsky.

★RUSSIAN 316 (3)—20th-Century Russian

Literature

(Alternate years)

Prerequisite: Russian 262 or equivalent. The novels, plays, poetry, and literary movements of the 20th century. Solzhenitsyn, Babel, Platonov, Mandelshtam, and Tsvetaeva are examples of authors examined. Conducted in Russian. Brodsky.

Fall

RUSSIAN 363 (6 or 3-3)—Supervised Study Abroad

Prerequisites: Russian 262 or equivalent or permission of the department, and approval of the Foreign Study Committee. A course designed to improve active oral proficiency in Russian and to introduce students to the culture and history of Russia. Classes are held at a prestigious Russian institution of higher education. Excursions are taken to major Russian cities and historic sites. Credits may be split between Russian and other disciplines with the approval of the departments involved. Staff.

Spring

RUSSIAN 401 (1), 402 (2), 403 (3)—Directed Individual Study

Prerequisite: Permission of the instructor. Advanced study in Russian. The nature of the course will be determined by the students' needs and by evaluation of their previous work. May be repeated for degree credit with permission and if the topics are different. Staff.

*Students with two or more entrance units in Russian will receive the lower number of credits indicated toward their degree requirements.

MAJOR

A major in **Russian studies** leading to a Bachelor of Arts degree requires the completion of at least 31 credits as follows:

1. Six credits in Russian at the 300 level or higher
2. Russian Studies 190
3. 12 credits, with at least one course each in history, literature in translation, and politics, chosen from among the courses in these three disciplines and designated below as Russian Studies courses
4. 12 credits chosen from the following Russian Studies courses not used to satisfy the requirements above
 - Art 380, when appropriate
 - Economics 311
 - History 320, 321, 322, and when appropriate 401, 402, 403
 - Literature in Translation 215, 263, 363
 - Politics 223, 226 (Sociology 226), 357, and when appropriate 380, 395, 401, 402, 403, 406
 - Russian 301, 302, 313, 315, 316, 363, 401, 402, 403
 - Russian Studies 401, 402, 403, 493
 - Sociology 225, 226 (Politics 226)

Additional courses required as prerequisites for completion of the above are Politics 101, 104, Russian 111-112 and 261-262. Junior standing is a prerequisite for all 300-level history courses.

RUSSIAN STUDIES 190 (1)—Bibliographical Resources

An introduction to the bibliographic tools useful in the study of Russia. Taught jointly by the library and Russian Studies faculty. Degree credit is awarded for only one 190 course regardless of academic discipline.

Prerequisite: Permission of the Russian Studies Committee.
